# **PASTORAL LETTER**

Billie Holliday sang: "Autumn in New York is often mingled with pain". In Wiltshire too it can be a contradictory season. Perhaps the most beautiful time of the year, autumn is also when life retreats a little, and some things in the natural world die. Periods when the colours of the turning trees are lit by brilliant sunshine alternate with dull skies, wind, and rain. Perhaps the contrast between brightness and the dark, and the awareness that winter is rushing towards us, that makes autumn such so precious.

On the surface of things, most of us live comfortable lives these days. It's hard to imagine that well into the post-War decades, things like central heating and indoor toilets were luxuries for the well-off. While too many people still struggle to make ends meet, many people in this country are very prosperous indeed.

But although infirmity and old age come to us all eventually, even the poorest of us have relatively little experience of things like the early death and crippling childhood diseases that were a given part of life for earlier generations. Thank the Lord for that! But perhaps this has made us complacent, even a little decadent?

Modern life is structured to distract us from reality. If I want to cheer myself up, I can buy myself something nice online at the click of a button and it will probably arrive the next day. If I'm worried, Spotify will serve me up a song it knows will cheer me up—or else YouTube will supply a video that will give me that lovely jolt of adrenaline that comes with being outraged and self -righteous.

At the same time, we all sense a certain nervousness in the present moment. Is this comfortable world we have created really capable of being sustained in the long-term? Our instincts tell us it isn't. Our instincts are often correct. The news is often depressing, whether we're looking at the state of world politics, the environment, or technology that seems not to serve us, but instead is designed to make us to serve it.

The reality is that people, and civilisations, like the autumn, are not designed to last forever: not in this world anyway. Death is just part of life.

Another one of our instincts is that this reality is not all there is to being human. That instinct is also a correct one. We know that our needs cannot be met merely by material goods or even emotional satisfaction; there is a spiritual side to human nature which also needs to be acknowledged and nourished if we are to live well.

I hope this doesn't come across as depressing. It should never be depressing to take a break from the constant distraction and consumerism and contemplate the reality of our lives. It is when we face difficult problems honestly and well that we renew our hope in life; facing the conundrums of human nature honestly renews our hope for life—and what comes next.




Thanks go to Helen Bodman and her helpers for inspiring it and organising it. Also, for the amazing donation to our Village Hall.

#### Home Upgrade Grant Scheme (HUGS) - do you qualify?

Wiltshire Council has been successful in securing more than £3.6m government funding for home energy efficiency upgrades. This funding will allow the council to support retrofitting in owner-occupied and privately rented homes (landlords with no more than four properties).

The qualifying criteria are:

- not connected to mains gas
- have an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of band D-G
- household income of less than £31,000

The retrofits will include:


- energy efficiency measures such as wall and loft insulation
- low-carbon heating technologies such as heat pumps
- renewable technologies such as solar PV
- smart measures such as smart heating controls

It would be great if qualifying residents in Worton and Marston could take advantage of this brilliant opportunity for warmer and more energy efficient homes.

The Trussell Trust Foodbank is part of a nationwide network of foodbanks 'working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK'.

There are many misconceptions about people who use the Foodbank. The people who find themselves in need of help to feed themselves and their families are not scroungers, they are not people who choose to avoid work. The Foodbank is there for those of us who face a crisis due to an accident, or a sudden rise in the cost of living, or a change in personal circumstances that leave them unable to make ends meet. The Foodbank provides essential supplies for a limited length of time whilst the individuals seek advice from Citizens Advice and other specialists to work out a solution to their problem. It is hoped that most people will only need to use the Foodbank for a couple of times. It is not an alternative to working and independent living in the long term.

Most of our customers are already in work. But as we all know, rental accommodation rates have shot up, as have food prices and energy bills, leaving lower wage earners without enough money to cover all their expenses.

The majority of people that come to the Foodbank are ashamed to have to ask for help, embarrassed to be there, and deeply grateful for anything they receive. It is humbling and gratifying to be able to help them and to send them off with the simple basics that we all require.

They leave with a pre-prepared box of food to last them 3 days, some toiletries, and some dog or cat food if they own one. We offer them a cup of tea or coffee, a biscuit and a chat with our Citizens Advice colleague. If they are homeless or lonely or just in need of someone to talk to, we try to provide some respite. They are people, just like you or me, who have met with temporary misfortune.

If you wish to contribute to the Foodbank, please consider buying a few extra items when you do your weekly shop. There is a box for donations at the back of the church or in most supermarkets. A few examples of contributions are:

- Tinned tomatoes, soup, baked beans, tuna, ham or vegetables
- Rice, pasta or packet mashed potato
- Tea or coffee
- Cereal
- Biscuits
- Shampoo, shower gel, toothpaste, toilet rolls
- Dog or cat food

Did you know if you own even one chicken you have to register them with the **Department for Environment**, Food & Rural Affairs?

Some of you may remember last month I shared that we have new additions to our family. Well, it turns out that even one chicken in your back garden must be registered by 1 October or you are breaking the law. This is to help manage and monitor any potential bird flu outbreak.

Register as a keeper of less than 50 poultry or other captive birds

To register chickens with Defra, you need to:

- Contact your local Animal Health Office (AHO) within one month of the chickens' arrival.
- Provide your CPH number and correspondence address.
- Once registered, you'll receive a Herd/Flock number.
- If you keep more than 50 chickens, registration with Defra is mandatory.
- Check local by-laws to ensure compliance with livestock regulations.

# MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

#### Update from Devizes Area Board

The Devizes Area Board meets four times each year and is a Wiltshire Council statutory meeting attended by the seven Wiltshire Councillors serving the Devizes Area, together with other stakeholders, parish council representatives and members of the public. There are 18 Area Boards across Wiltshire, and they work alongside other organisations to make things happen in the community. These groups can include town and parish councils, voluntary and community groups, youth organisations, sports clubs and local charities.

The September Area Board received detailed updates from Wiltshire Police and the Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership and given that these are key issues for Parish Councils and residents across Devizes Rural West I thought that I would share these in my article, this month.

Chris Wickham, acting Neighbourhood Inspector for the Devizes Area, explained Devizes Police priorities: Theft/Burglary offences, Street Drinking and Anti-Social Behaviour in Devizes Market Place and Increases in Police Visibility. Detailed information is available each month on the Your Area section of the Wiltshire Police website. In July and August 306 crimes and 350 incidents were reported – which is a stable position. There has been a slight drop in theft, a drop in sexual offences and increases in drugs and possession of weapons offences. He also commented on the recent murder (Easterton) and attempted murder (Sidmouth Street, Devizes) and highlighted that these were very rare, and in both cases the victims and accused were known to each other.

It was also good to hear that the Police are focusing on visibility in the community. You can sign up to the Community Messaging service at <u>www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk</u> and also follow Devizes Police on Facebook and "X".

Perry Payne from the Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership updated the meeting on the Partnership's work. It includes, Wiltshire

Council, Swindon Borough Council, Highways England, Wiltshire Police, Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service, South West Ambulance Service and the Ministry of Defence. ocus areas are Intervention (including supporting Community Speedwatch and Speed Indicator Devices - SIDs), Enforcement and Education – including Operation Close Pass – Equine, and what's known as the Fatal5 (Careless driving, Drink/drug driving, Not wearing a seatbelt, Distraction and Speeding).

Locally I'm delighted that Seend and Worton now have active Community Speedwatch Teams, because CSW and SIDs together really do make a difference and provide helpful data for further police enforcement. Since 2020 over 4000 CSW letters have been sent to motorists as a result of speeding. At the sites in Seend and Worton speeding motorists are around 1% and less than the other sites in the Devizes area.

Wiltshire Council devolves significant funding to the Area Boards in order for them to invest in local community projects and initiatives that meet local priorities. More information is at <u>Area Board Grants - Wiltshire Council</u> and I was delighted at the last meeting to support the grant application from Worton Village Hall for funding towards a new kitchen. If your local group would like to apply for an Area Board grant, please do get in touch.

# WORTON PARISH COUNCIL

The September Parish Council meeting was a particularly busy one with some important issues raised and discussed. Amongst the topics covered was the challenges that have been faced related to the management of recent flooding issues and particularly the collapse of part of the bank along the Mill Leet, which has made a much-loved footpath unusable for several months. Alan Midgeley was kind enough to update us on developments. The Midgelys have employed Ed Bodman to repair and reinforce the bank. We understand that this work is very nearly completed, and the Parish Council will work with Wiltshire Council to reopen the footpath as soon as possible. Alan Midgely reiterated that without this work, the risk of further flooding would have been significant. In response to this situation, the Parish Council agreed to work with Wiltshire Council, as the Local Lead Flood Authority, to review future flooding risks, to update Worton's local flood plan, and to identify any potential funding to help recovery from flooding events.

Bill Francis also attended the meeting to give us opportunity to air any questions we might wish to put to the Charity in the light of the consultation that has been taking place in relation to the proposal to construct new housing on their land. The only point we wanted to make was a hope that any new development could include access to the existing Whatley's field recreation area to possibly assist in the improvement of recreation facilities there. We await the submission of plans with interest.

With recreation in mind, planning for how to make best use of the finance that is coming our way linked to the new housing development that is really beginning to take shape. We have been delighted by the interest shown in village recreation facilities by students from Five Lanes school and we have invited them to attend our October meeting to listen to their ideas before we discuss what can be done.

We were also very pleased to make a grant of  $\pm 10,000$  to the Village Hall trustees in addition to  $\pm 12,500$  from the Community Fund - for which the Village Hall renovation makes an excellent fit. It's great to see things beginning to happen following so much hard work by trustees past and present (and I feel I should remind villagers of the

important role played by Veronica over a number of years). The Village Hall feels like a particularly vibrant place at the moment (Sarah and I had a great time at the recent Barn dance) and I would really encourage villagers to keep an eye on the other events Lionel and his team have in store for us. They are a great reminder of just what brilliant places Worton and Marston are to live.

Whilst on the subject, Chris and David Johnson gave us some more information in relation to their plans for an event to mark the 80th Anniversary of the ending of World War 2 which will, I'm sure, offer another opportunity to come together as a community in a suitable way.


Wiltshire Police having developed the process remain the only national force to utilise the data downloaded from Speed Indicator Devices to more effectively deploy the Road Policing Units.

## FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Marigold (Tagetes)

Another member of the Aster family shares the honour of the flower of the month for October. The unassuming and versatile glowing heads of marigolds may still adorn your garden well into the first hard frost. There are three main types: French, African (American), and signet. They vary in colour from orange, yellow, red and bi-colours. The pot marigolds, native to southern Europe are in the Calendula genus and are not true marigolds.

Tagetes get their name from Tages, a prophet who founded the ancient Etruscan religion. The common name of marigold, with their warm golden blooms were often used as offerings to the Virgin Mary by patrons who did not have actual gold for their prayers. Hence, the name mari-gold.

In some cultures they symbolise resurrection and are thought to attract the souls of the dead. In Mexico, they are used in the Day of the Dead ritual where the strong scent and bright colours are used to create a path between the front door and a small altar in the home. Similarly, in Victorian flower language, they are a symbol of grief, despair, and mourning and are used as remembrance flowers for departed loved ones.




