

Hello all,

Welcome to the December edition. By the time you read this the Village Hall kitchen should be completed and usable for the 7th of December Christmas Bazaar. We are, and I'm sure you are, looking forward to being done with the building work and mess.

In order to continue to improve the overall look, feel and experience of the hall we are planning to complete some additional cosmetic work early next year, such as an internal refresh and painting, some refurbishment of the wooden floor and possibly an external concrete path around the back.

In the interests of continued progress, we will also install internet, Wi-Fi and a ceiling projector sometime in Q1 2025. If you want the very latest on that, I will post updates on the W&M Community Facebook Page and the WMVH Facebook page.

EVENTS

In November we had some private events, which were unfortunately compromised by the building work and we cancelled some of our other plans, such as a 2nd Bingo Night and a Jumble Sale. Hirers were very understanding and in general most continued to use the hall with its limitations.

For December we will run the usual Christmas Bazaar on the 7th, so lookout for posters and social media posts. As I have only been a Trustee since February, this will be my 1st Christmas Bazaar experience!

<u>Kitchen open day</u>. We will run a separate 'open kitchen' event, with tea/coffee and nibbles, for people to have a look around and to promote future use by the community. The timing of this will be posted separately because we are still in some flux on the completion date, so it may potentially creep into early January.

2025. Looking forward to the New Year, we are seeking ideas and involvement in new events. As a Trustee Group we organise and run some events ourselves, but as you can imagine we simply can't handle more than a few.

So, we are looking for new ideas for future events and someone to coordinate and run them. Some thoughts brought forward so far are:

- a themed film evening (where we run the film in the background) along with food and drinks
- an afternoon film event for children
- a murder mystery evening (hold 18 January in your diaries)
- a food-based event.



CHRISTMAS shoppers have the chance to browse unique gifts from craftsmen and women amid the atmospheric surroundings of Bowood at the Bowood Festive Food and Gift Fair on **Monday December 2 and Tuesday December 3.**

The annual fair, in the Kerry Suite at the Bowood Hotel Spa and Golf Resort between Calne and Chippenham, is not just a showcase for the best in local producers, it raises vital funds for the Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust, says Director Jennie Shaw.

"The fair is such a lovely event because within the setting of Bowood's hotel, with the music, carols and the buzz of everyone shopping, you really get a sense of the season," said Jennie.

"It's such a joyous time but it also helps us to think of those who need our help all year round. The money raised by the fair will go such a long way to continuing to support the safety and joy of those vulnerable people and will allow them to enjoy the festive period too."

The Monday evening's preview event runs from 4pm to 8pm at just £15 per ticket. Visitors will be greeted with a glass of wine and canapes, as well as atmospheric music and carols in the Kerry Suite.

The fair is open again at 9am on Tuesday December 3 and will be running through to 3pm - providing another chance to meet up with friends to shop, have coffee or lunch in the hotel's Shelburne Restaurant to share Christmas plans and enjoy the festive atmosphere.

Home Upgrade Grant Scheme (HUGS) - do you qualify?

This scheme runs until March 2025. If you feel you may qualify, apply soon before it's too late.

Wiltshire Council has been successful in securing more than £3.6m government funding for home energy efficiency upgrades. This funding will allow the council to support retrofitting in owner-occupied and privately rented homes (landlords with no more than four properties).

The qualifying criteria are:

- not connected to mains gas
- have an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of band D-G
- household income of less than £31,000

The retrofits will include:

- energy efficiency measures such as wall and loft insulation
- low-carbon heating technologies such as heat pumps
- renewable technologies such as solar PV
- smart measures such as smart heating controls

It would be great if qualifying residents in Worton and Marston could take advantage of this brilliant opportunity for warmer and more energy efficient homes.

MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

Devizes Gateway and other rail improvements in the county, move a step closer.

Network Rail has published its Wiltshire Rail Strategic Study, which sets out the basis of strategic rail planning in the county in the future. It follows the business cases developed by Wiltshire Council under the previous government's Restoring your Railway scheme which were championed in Westminster, and locally, by Michelle Donelan and Danny Kruger.

The Wiltshire Rail Strategic Study, led by Network Rail and local partners, looks at how rail services can support the county's growing population and economy. It suggests improvements to rail connectivity within Wiltshire and to key regional hubs to connect the county to the rest of the country. It highlights that the current rail system lacks frequent and direct services, especially in north-south routes, and needs better links to hubs such as Oxford and Birmingham.

Its key recommendations look to increase services, grow passenger numbers and build new stations, including:

- Enhance local services, especially on the TransWilts route (via Melksham), to improve connectivity within Wiltshire.
- Build new stations at Devizes and Corsham to support population growth and increase rail usage.
- Develop new direct rail services between Wiltshire and key hubs.

• Upgrade track and signalling infrastructure, such as in Westbury and Melksham, to accommodate more services and improve connections at Westbury.

The wide-ranging Network Rail report looks to improve connectivity and transport links in Wiltshire and beyond. It also supports our county's sustainable economic and population growth, helping the county to expand sustainably, while also improving regional connectivity, and boosting both passenger numbers and freight use of the railways.

There is a still a long way to go before the objectives of this study can be realised, and Network Rail will now begin detailed analysis of the proposals before taking forward business cases to progress these projects. The good news is that this in rail industry led – and as Cabinet Member for Transport a Wiltshire Council, I will

ensure that the Council continues to work with Network Rail and other partners to take these projects forward and to keep lobbying Government to invest in rail

improvements throughout Wiltshire.

WORTON PARISH COUNCIL

This is the time of the year when we go through our finances and work out what we will need to spend money on over the next financial year. Much of this is predetermined anyway, for example grounds maintenance and the cost of running the council. To misquote Shakespeare, "though we be small we be accountable". The same legalities apply as far larger arms of government.

In fact, we have found ourselves in an unusual situation as our income has taken a temporary jump due to money linked to the housing development. This put us temporarily into a different category of financial scrutiny and reporting which has been, frankly, right outside my personal comfort zone! Very fortunately, Cllr Powell continues to provide sensible, calm guidance and we have managed the situation well- however it's been a very steep learning curve. So, we will be taking even greater care to account for every penny (thank goodness farthings are no longer available) whilst keeping a lid on how the money we all have put into this via the precept part of our Council Tax. (which I hasten to add is a tiny part of what we all pay). On the positive side, we will have an exciting chance to improve recreation facilities and we will keep in mind the ideas shared with us by the younger residents of the village.

We will know more or less where we stand by the December meeting which, as in previous years, will be starting earlier at 6, to allow the strident tones of councillors and attendees to contribute to Beer (expertly) and Carols (gamely), at the pub.

It's good to report that, thanks largely to the skills and drive of my colleague Cllr Slack, we have been moved to the "green" category by LHFIG, which means we will get support and most of the funding for improvements along the High street. We will share the details nearer the time when the work happens (again I stress that those most impacted have already been consulted), but this is unlikely to be until the second half of the new year, with work taking place probably during one of the school holidays.

Whilst still on highways and footpaths (that's the H and the F of the LHFIG cleared up if you didn't know), we have been trying to make sense of what is happening with the footpath behind the church. We were somewhat taken aback when finding out that there is a cost involved in the closure of a footpath, just as there would be with, say, the M25, and someone has to pay it! Unfortunately, in the case of Worton and, in this situation, Marston, that has fallen to the Church -and the figure came as an unpleasant surprise, especially given that those involved had no wish to shut the path but had to do so following consideration of health and safety advice and, indeed, regulation. I must report that Bob and other church representatives have been most sanguine in their reaction, and we are also grateful for Tamara's support in at least limiting the financial shock.

However, the fact remains that the relevant section of the path remains closed until suitable restoration work has been completed. Whilst we will continue to work on alternative solutions, I must strongly advise walkers not to ignore the signs - if you choose to do so, literally, on your own head be it.

Nick Stokes continues to lead the preparation for our planned entry to the Best kept Village competition and has submitted a detailed plan. It's very clear that Nick can't do this on his own, so please consider what help you can offer. Of course, we all need to play our part however small that might be.

Lastly, I personally was recently able to experience the improvements that are almost complete in our Village Hall. These are the culmination of years of work by all the people who have been working on this project. Of course, we are grateful to Lionel and the current trustees, but it was particularly suitable that Veronica (and a resurgent healthy Geoff) were in the village over the weekend and were able to see for themselves.

On the 6^{th} November three vehicles were monitored exceeding the speed limit with one recorded at 47mph. Depending on previous convictions and history the driver of the vehicle travelling at 47mph will face £100 fine and get 3 points, the other two will be offered a speed awareness course.


Captured footage will be analysed for other offences like seat belts and mobile phone use.

FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Holly (Ilex aquifolium)

Pointed leaves. That's what *Ilex aquifolium* means. I love the simplicity of the name. It is what it's named. Hollies are either male or female and only the female produce the berries. These berries provide a rich source of food for birds and wildlife through the cold winter months. However, I would recommend keeping your pets away from them as they can be toxic to dogs and cats. The vet bill from earlier this year proves it!

Throughout history, holly was believed to protect against evil and represented renewal of life and light. The Celts and Romans both used holly in their homes to ward off evil spirits. The Pagans and Celts associated holly with the Holly King, who ruled the Earth between the summer and winter solstices.

For Christians, holly symbolizes Christ's crown of thorns. The evergreen leaves represent life after death. The berries are believed to be white and only red as they were stained with his blood.

Holly can grow in either shrub or tree forms. They are best planted in the spring or fall in a sunny spot with well-draining and slightly acid soil. The foliage adds that festive look to holiday décor with wreaths and boughs of holly draped over the mantel. Especially since they are associated with happiness and optimism.




