



Just Take a Moment... May '24


I wonder if like me you are someone who appreciates a quiet moment in the day to just be? Not to **do**, but simply to **be**? Sometimes it is hard to stop **doing**, it can seem like our lives and our world are moving too fast for us and we can find ourselves feeling guilty if we are not keeping pace. There are times too when others expect a lot from us, and we can also have unrealistic expectations of ourselves. The world can be a very noisy place and our inner world can become very noisy too. Perhaps that is why the practice of Mindfulness has become so popular in recent years as a tool for helping us slow down and appreciate the small things in life.

The seasons we experience within our natural world can help us to become more in tune with that which lies beyond ourselves and that which lies within us. Whether you consider yourself to be a religious or spiritual person or not, our outer landscape can teach us a lot about our inner life as human beings.

One of the things I like to do in spring and early summer is to listen to the birdsong first thing in the morning and again at dusk. If I can I try and spot which bird is singing which song and am often surprised at the amazing sounds which come from some of the tiniest creatures! Taking time to listen to those we meet in the course of our day is important too. One of the greatest gifts we can really give someone

else is a listening ear and an open heart. We can all tell if someone is interested in us and cares about us if they seek to really listen and understand us.

Many of the great spiritual teachers show us how to listen, as did Jesus. Jesus regularly took time out to go off alone, often to a solitary place, to pray, to listen. He then returned better equipped to listen and minister to the needs of others.



I once picked up a helpful card at an airport 'quiet room/chapel'. I remember it was headed Take 5 minutes. Sit down, 1 minute, say thank you for something, 1 minute, say sorry for something, 1 minute, pray for someone, 1 minute, pray for yourself, 1 minute.

Hopefully you will have more than 5 minutes to do the above but taking 5 is better than taking nothing!

On two occasions during March Wiltshire Police Speed enforcement team members were observed in the village. Their presence may well be the result of the data we are providing from the Speed Indicator Devices.



Home Upgrade Grant Scheme (HUGS) - do you qualify?

MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

May 2024 - Annual Report

Wiltshire Council's Annual Report for Town and Parish Councils can be found at Resources for Town and Parish Councils - Democratic Services - Wiltshire Council

- here are some highlights.

Secure Finances – Investing in Key Services: Despite the ongoing budget pressures arising from increasing demand for services and inflationary costs, the Council has been able to effectively manage these challenges to ensure a firm financial footing. Key to this sustainable approach to delivering for Wiltshire, is to invest in services, especially those which tackle issues in a proactive way. The Council receives nearly 83% of its funding from local taxes, Business Rates, and Council Tax, so we take delivering on our promises to local people very seriously.

Children's Services – Outstanding Ofsted: We want to give Wiltshire's children the best start in life as it is fundamental in improving their long-term life chances and gives them the best opportunity to live full and healthy lives. We have worked relentlessly to improve our services and now deliver consistently Outstanding services that ensure the needs of families and children are met at the right time by the right people. This is reflected in the Ofsted inspection report from November 2023 that rated us Outstanding across the board.

Additional Funding for Highways & Flood Prevention: Heat, flooding and severe winter weather has caused significant damage to some of Wiltshire's roads in 2023. Whilst the overall condition of Wiltshire's classified road network is better than the national average this continues to be a priority. We are investing an additional £10m in Highways maintenance, which together with increased Department for Transport (DfT) funding, will enable an extensive programme of road surfacing and treatment in 2024/25. We are also investing an additional £1m to support preventative drainage programmes and have confirmed additional £1.5m funding from 25/26 onwards to help with gully cleaning and potholes.

£179m for Adult Services, which includes over £9m of efficiency savings:

Adult Social Care accounts for the highest percentage spend of Wiltshire Council's budget and continues to see significant demographic and cost pressures. The Transforming Adult Social Care programme ensures that the Council is proactive

in ensuring services meet need. Continued investment is being made in preventative, enablement and reablement services that support people to stay in their own homes and take full part in their communities. The Shared Lives Scheme, which offers a fostering style model of care and support continues to grow, and the use of Technology Enabled Care (TEC) is a key priority. Moving from children to adult services is one of the most critical times for anyone's life, this is even more important for young adults who have Special Education Needs and Disabilities.

Locally, I have continued to support Parish Councils and residents with specific local matters, and it is a pleasure to attend Parish Council meetings across the area. I was very pleased to assist with fixing the prolonged mobile phone outage in Potterne and Worton, and I will continue to press for road safety improvements across the area, especially at Black Dog and Bell Crossroads. I have helped many Parishes with flooding issues access Wiltshire Council resources, and I am pressing the Environment Agency to find a long-term solution for the issues with the Mill Leat and Semington Brook in Worton and Marston. Looking forward, I will continue to support efforts to ensure that the planning applications for the large solar installations in Potterne are refused and to galvanise support from Danny Kruger and Michelle Donelan, where national policy needs reviewing. My huge apologies if I haven't mentioned your local issue this time – you can be assured that it is on my "to do" list – please do get in touch if I can help.

Naming for the Housing development at Sandleaze farm

The plan is that suggested names will have been submitted at, or prior to, the annual Parish meeting which recently took place. We will be considering ideas, producing a shortlist, and then submitting to the relevant authority.

I'm pleased to say that I am already aware of some excellent suggestions. The process isn't as simple as may appear and we cannot make the final choice ourselves - only provide suggestions. There are issues of protocol and practicality that can override local wishes. For example, the number of other streets with similar names and their location. Personal names can also be a sensitive issue. As an aside, I recently came across AC/DC Lane in Melbourne, which conjures up all sorts of potential issues -maybe a Highway to Hell?

Malcolm's Wellies. (also known as The Environmental Working Group)

I'm really grateful to Malcolm and his enthusiastic volunteers for all they do in this important aspect of village life. Again, the Annual meeting should have given us more opportunity to put ideas forward and get really organised for...

Best Kept Village Competition

We have decided to enter this prestigious event, but with the actual submission being made in April 2025. I am really appreciative of the efforts Nick Stokes has made in investigating the idea and carrying out a lot of the important research and groundwork.

We considered going ahead with an entry in this year's event - benefiting from work already scheduled linked to the upcoming Open Gardens event and mindful that there is a best Newcomer award where we might have stood a reasonable chance of success.

After careful consideration we have decided to defer entry so that the work that would be needed to impress the judges could be done in a planned fashion, with an eye on the seasons etc. This would give an opportunity to form a group of enthusiastic residents, engage as much of the village as possible (for example the school), and hopefully not only give us more chance of success, but also give us an on-going environment of which we can be even more proud.

Housing Development Progress

Obviously, things have really begun to happen, and so far, any issues have been relatively minor and dealt with in a timely fashion. We do have points of contact with Newland to engage as necessary and expect to be kept in the loop as it were.

On a more positive note, we are becoming clearer about what financial benefits will occur for the village and we will be consulting on what residents would like. In the first instance, this will be in terms of improving the Sandleaze play area. It would be great to get as much community involvement in this as possible -though it should be noted that the sort of equipment that we may hope to get can be very expensive!

Jubilee Walkway

Concerns were raised at the meeting regarding where exactly the designated Walkway route should begin and end. Whilst progress has been made, final siting decisions are yet to be made. We intend to work with Newland to determine where exactly the route should begin at the eastern end and, thus, where the plaque should be located.

Transport and Road Safety

We are finalising our submission to the LHFIG for support in this area. We basically have two proposals. One is the installation of a new marked crossing point to link the pavements on either side of the road (near to the Rose and Crown) and a reduction of the speed limit on the eastern approach to the village. Obviously, these ideas are even more relevant given the likely impacts of the new housing development when completed. I am, as always, indebted to Richard Slack for his work in this area.

Village Hall Kitchen Project

We were pleased to be given an update on the progress of the project by Lionel Dawson. Whilst there has been something of a one step back, we were delighted to be appraised of the two steps forward currently happening and were pleased to offer our continued support as the picture clarifies.

WORTON UNITED CHARITIES

The Charity has been in existence for many years with an objective of supporting the 'poor and needy' of the parishes of Worton and Marton. Initially this support was often in the provision of foodstuffs, and clothing, then focused on financial help. To do this, the Charity rents out a number of plots of lands for allotments or small holding as well as receiving interest gained from its investments. Some years ago, when interest rates fell, the Charity was faced with a dramatic fall in income from its investments and depended almost entirely on rent from tenants. Costs related to upkeep of the plots continued. So, some time ago, whilst continuing to give individual grants and gifts to those who required help, we took the decision to temporarily end annual help and assistance.

The Trustees have been considering how the Charity can react in these circumstances to enable it to carry on supporting both local individuals and groups into the future. We feel that in the current environment, our model needs to change in order that the Charity can provide more assistance and support to people in our local community in a sustainable way.

A few years ago, the Trustees worked up a proposal to develop a small parcel of land (0.68 acres) bordering the High Street and Mill Road, next to Whatley's Close, for a residential area of up to eight new homes. Two of these new homes were to be retained by the Charity and managed as rental properties to local people, provided at discounted rental rates. The regular rental income to the Charity would then allow it to support local individuals and groups (e.g. through grants and gifts) to a much greater degree and in a sustainable way into the future.



Following engagement with the village in 2016, which confirmed a broad consensus of support for our housing proposal, the scheme design was revised (including reducing the number of houses proposed from 9 to 8) and a planning application was submitted in 2017; however, this was then withdrawn later that same year prior to determination.

The Charity wishes to announce that it would like to revisit this proposal and the Trustees are in the process of reviewing how we can best support the local community, including by offering local people access to:

- Two Charity owned homes at discounted rent
- Grants to support them either directly or by working with other existing organisations

We have also begun discussions with a development partner to work with us, initially by reviewing the previous 2017 planning application, undertaking some early site assessment work, and assessing the current planning context to re-assess the development potential of the same parcel of land.

Over the next few weeks, the Charity would like to consult with local residents to discuss these plans in greater detail. We will be attending the Annual Parish Meeting on 30th April and are keen to hear any initial views and reactions to this update and in particular any thoughts on activities the Charity can explore to offer help to the local community.

We will also host a separate consultation at the Village Hall on Wednesday 12th June from 5pm to 8pm to which all residents are invited. Here the Trustees will give further details of the activities the Charity is looking to pursue (including based on feedback from the Annual Parish Meeting). We will also introduce our development partner and provide initial information regarding the proposed residential development and will seek to answer any questions you have.

FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Hawthorn (Crataegus monogyna)

Hawthorns belong to the genus Crataegus which is derived from the Greek words kratos, meaning strength and akis, meaning sharp. This is in reference to the strong wood of the shrub and the long thorns that grow on most varities. They are also part of the Rosaceae (rose) family, although not as sweetly scented. Which is probably why, during medieval times, the hawthorn was believed to herald illness and death and were associated with the plague.

We now know that their scent, which smells like decaying animals, is due to the chemical trimethylamine. This is the first chemicals formed in decaying animal tissue. While they make great hedges, I'm not sure I would want them growing in my garden.

The hawthorn blossoms at the point when spring turns to summer. It is believed that the old saying 'Cast ne'er a clout ere May is out' was referring to the opening of the hawthorn flowers rather than the end of the month.

While their fragrance is less desirable, the medicinal properties of hawthorns have been studied extensively. Hawthorn has been used to treat blood diseases, chest pains, blood pressure issue and even high cholesterol. Most of the medicinal value can be found in the fruit pigments—which are edible and can be made into jelly and wine. Hopefully the foul scent doesn't follow through to the fruit.

The Bridge

"WHAT DOES A HIGH SHERIFF DO?"

On 8th April, in County Hall, I handed over as High Sheriff of Wiltshire to Mrs Anna Grange, who farms with her husband near Malmesbury. She is the first lady to hold that post since Ela, Countess of Salisbury in 1228. I told Mrs Grange that the question I was most often asked during my Shrieval year was "What does the High Sheriff do?". So

Because of the origins of the High Sheriff I spent quite a proportion of the 100 plus engagements during my year with those in the County in uniform. Nearly always accompanied by my wife, we were privileged to discover how the Wiltshire Constabulary operated, and "saw behind the scenes" in the Police HQ in Devizes; I presented long service medals to special constables, and bravery awards to policemen. I also exercised my right to sit with County Court judges in both Swindon and Salisbury, where I also presented bravery awards to members of the public. We visited the Wiltshire Ambulance Service, presented long service awards, and saw how the Service reacted to 999 calls. We visited the Wiltshire Fire Brigade, and again saw how they reacted to calls. In the case of all three of these uniformed services I was tremendously impressed with the leadership, the dedication and the professionalism of those who look after us in the County - we are lucky to be so well served. Still dealing with those in uniform, we visited Erlestoke Prison, and were impressed with the steps taken there to prepare prisoners for their return to normal life. We also saw a good deal of the three Armed Services.

I found myself in churches a lot! We attended the enthronement of the new Bishop of Salisbury and witnessed the high pageantry of the occasion; we attended legal services in Bristol and Wells Cathedrals, and I ran my own service for the legal profession in Malmesbury Abbey. I attended the Girl Guides Thinking Day service, the Alms House service, and the Farewell Service to the Wiltshire Regiment, all in Salisbury Cathedral. We attended Carol Services in Erlestoke Prison and with the Fire Brigade.

We paid a lot of visits, and in every case I was able to say thank you to a large number of deserving people who work hard for the good of the community, and who do not get thanked often enough for their dedicated work. We spent a day with the WRVS, including their Meals on Wheels service; we watched the Talking Newspaper service for the blind in Marlborough being recorded; we saw what wonderful work is done by the Wiltshire Community Trust and the Workout centre in Melksham for the unemployed; we were so impressed by the Probation Service work in Swindon; and we visited Avon Rubber and Bowvers factories to see how tyres and sausage rolls were made. I visited several of the District Councils in the County, and we made friends with a large number of the Mayors at both official functions such as Mayor Making and Mayoral Balls as well as more solemn occasions such as the eight Royal visits to the County during the year.

We entertained a large number of people in the County at lunch or dinner parties, and we were lucky to pick the one week of blazing sunshine last summer for the four parties held in the marquee on our lawn, during which we entertained over 900; at the last of these we raised £1100 for my wife's charity, Action Research,

Music played an important part of the year, because the Charity I chose to support was the Wiltshire Music Centre project, which aims to raise £600,000 to build a special concert hall cum rehearsal place for the 2000 young in the County who belong to one of the Wiltshire Youth Orchestras, and who at present have no home of their own. We heard at first hand on many occasions the very high standard these young musicians achieve, and we attended

concerts in Salisbury, Swindon and Trowbridge; I ran a concert at Dauntsey's School, given by The King's Singers in aid of this charity at which we raised over £13,000.

So, the High Sheriff was kept occupied! Perhaps the single most abiding impression of my year was the very humbling experience of meeting so many people who give of their own time to help others in the County, serving the community in ways large and small, but all with dedication and keen professionalism. Perhaps because of the opportunity it gave me to say thank you to all these wonderful people the job is a worthwhile one; it was certainly a memorable, interesting and most enjoyable year.

THE HIGH SHERIFF OF WILTSHIRE

The current High Sheriff is Dr. Olivia Chapple who is the co-founder and chair of the trustees of Horatio's Garden Charity. Horatio was her eldest son.

Dr Olivia trained in medicine at St Thomas's Hospital London, followed by postgraduate training at The Royal Free Hospital and worked as a general practitioner until 2011. She served as a charity Board Director for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation until 2012. As a GP she was an advocate of the benefits of gardens and gardening and has seen first-hand how the natural environment can enhance wellbeing.

In 2017 Dr Olivia was awarded a 'Points of Light' award by the Prime Minister for voluntary service. In 2020, she was awarded the Carew Pole Award by the RHS in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the world of horticulture.

THEME FOR 2024-25

The theme Dr Olivia has chosen for her High Sheriff year will be focused on charities involved with **connecting people with nature**.
